

I. Quarterly Highlights

APICDA's employment goal for 2000 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the first quarter, a total of 54 job positions (48 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$317,662.

During the first quarter, ten individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

A total of sixteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the first quarter of the year. Effective January 1, 2000, APICDA increased its higher education scholarships from \$3,000 per individual per year to \$5,000 per individual per year.

APICDA will host its second annual Community Outreach Conference in early May. The conference is attended by representatives from the local government, the village corporation, and the local traditional council or IRA from each of APICDA's eligible communities. The APICDA board and staff also attend. The purpose of the conference is to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages.

The Coastal Villages Resource Fund (CVRF) has become a partner in the Ocean Prowler, L.L.C. by purchasing twenty percent of the company (APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc., also owns twenty percent of the company).

APICDA completed its Bering Sea "A" Season CDQ pollock fishery during the first quarter, and conducted some Pacific cod CDQ fishing. Both fisheries were clean operations. Please see Table 10 for details.

Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. was formed during the first quarter. BPS is a joint venture between AJV and Aleutian Quality Seafoods, Inc., with each company owning fifty percent. BPS will initially operate the barge Dipper in False Pass, buying and processing salmon, Pacific cod, halibut, and other species. When the new boat harbor is constructed in False Pass (hopefully, within the next three years), BPS will construct a shore plant adjacent to the harbor and expand its production.

APICDA will be launching a major, new intern program this summer. The intern program will provide summer employment opportunities to residents receiving higher education scholarships. APICDA will offer interns employment in companies in which it has ownership, with its CDQ partners, and with other companies in a variety of occupational fields related to the needs of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands. Salaries and other costs will be borne in whole or part by APICDA. Interns will be able to return to the program year after year during their college career. Eventually, interns could be offered full-time positions with APICDA or its subsidiaries.

II. Community Development

A. Progress Toward Goals, Objectives, Milestones

The following is a review of the highlights from APICDA's goals, objectives, and milestones. See Tables 1 through 7 for a specific review of all milestones, by community.

- 1.) Employment: APICDA's employment goal for 2000 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the first quarter, a total of 54 job positions (48 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$318,000.
- 2.) Training: APICDA's goal is to provide vocational education and training assistance for any resident who desires the opportunity or needs help. During the first quarter, ten individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.
- 3.) Education: A total of sixteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the first quarter of the year. Higher education scholarships are \$5,000 per school year per individual.
- 4.) APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. (AJV) Activities: AJV activities during the first quarter consisted of overseeing the various subsidiary corporations, including Atka Pride Seafoods, Kayux Development, L.L.C., APICDA Vessels, Inc., the Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C., the Nazan Bay Inn, Prowler, L.L.C., Ocean Prowler, L.L.C., and Golden Dawn, L.L.C. AJV continued to discuss the formation of new joint ventures corporations, and to review other investment opportunities.
- 5.) APICDA Vessels, Incorporated (AVI): AVI activities during the first quarter consisted of preparing its fleet for the upcoming fisheries. This includes the three AP boats, the *Stardust*, the *Bonanza*, and the halibut sport charter vessel *Grand Aleutian*. Two additional AP-style vessels will enter the AVI fleet this year, and will fish halibut, cod and other species.
- 6.) Small Vessel Acquisition Program (SVAP): During the December, 1998, board meeting, the SVAP was suspended. The suspension will carry through 2000 while the board reviews methods to improve the program.
- 7.) Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) Activities: APS will start up in May. APS operated profitably in 1999.

8.) Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C.: St. George fishermen, fishing for Puffin Seafoods, will start fishing in mid-June. The fish will be tendered to St. Paul, where they were processed. Puffin Seafoods operated profitably in 1999.

9.) Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C.: The company is open for business, and some activity is taking place.

10.) OceanLogic, L.L.C.: OceanLogic, L.L.C., is completing development of new software capable of managing shoreside and mothership cooperatives in compliance with the American Fisheries Act and Steller Sea Lion rules and regulations. Software for a vessel monitoring system and an electronic logbook are also nearing completion.

11.) Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. and the Barge Dipper: The Dipper will move to False Pass in May, and BPS will commence operations in early June. This has been a major project for AJV, and will be a huge boost to the economy and families of False Pass.

12.) Nikolski Near Shore Resource Assessment: In 1999, APICDA initiated an assessment of the near shore fishery resources in the Nikolski area. The focus was on rockfish, sea bass, octopus, shrimp and other species. The *NIKKA D*, AJV's twenty-eight foot skiff from Atka, was deployed for the assessment. The crew is from Nikolski. The assessment will continue in 2000.

13.) Nikolski Lodge: Construction of the lodge facility for the Nikolski Lodge commenced during the first quarter. The building, slightly in excess of 4,000 square feet, is being constructed by Lindal Cedar Homes. Construction will be complete by mid-May, whether the facility will be shipped to Nikolski for on-site construction. If schedules are maintained, the lodge will open in late August or early September, 2000.

14.) Sea Urchins: APICDA submitted applications to ADF&G in April, 1999, to conduct sea urchin mariculture operations at various locations in the Aleutian Islands and the Alaska Peninsula. APICDA also resumed its sea urchin resource assessment last summer.

Following several weeks of discussion with the Alaska Department of Fish & Game, APICDA withdrew its mariculture applications without prejudice. Instead, we hope to work collaboratively with ADF&G personnel to conduct a small commercial fishery in St. George this summer.

15.) Flatfish Development: APICDA continues to develop its plans to become a participant in the flatfish industry. We have retained individuals familiar with the industry and marketing to assist us. CDQ yellowfin sole harvesting occurred in the fourth quarter. Samples of various species were produced and sent to Europe for market analysis. Results of the analysis are helping to determine future directions.

16.) AJV/Snopac Products Joint Venture: AJV formed a joint venture with Snopac Products to operate the processing vessel Snopac in St. George for the opilio crab fishery. Both parties are equally sharing the risks of the operation. This was an important factor in maintaining Snopac's presence in St. George given the substantial reduction in the opilio GHJ and the attendant economic impacts.

B. Outreach

APICDA staff traveled to many of our communities during the first quarter to meet with residents and discuss a wide variety of CDQ and development related issues. APICDA's human resources director, the Unalaska field representative, and the local community liaison officers met frequently to share information regarding employment, training, and other opportunities.

In May, APICDA will host the second annual Community Outreach Conference. This will be a two day meeting of the leaders from each of APICDA's eligible CDQ villages. The purpose of the conference is to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages.

C. Employment

See Table 8 for a quarterly and year-to-date review of employment activity.

1.) Management/Administrative: During the first quarter, there were twenty-two local residents who received compensation for management/administrative duties. These functions ranged from staff employment, honorariums, to Community Liaison Officers (CLO) activities. The total expended during the quarter was \$103,813.

2.) Direct Employment from CDQ Pollock Fishing: There were four residents employed in pollock fishing and/or processing operations at-sea on the Starbound during the quarter. Total compensation was \$71,300.

3.) Other Fishing: Eight individuals were employed as crew members in the Pacific cod fisheries. Initial wages were \$48,484, although several individuals have not yet received full compensation.

4.) Other Employment: Nineteen individuals were employed in a variety of non-direct fishery activities, including the gear storage warehouse in Nelson Lagoon, construction projects directly related to APICDA CDP projects, and other activities. Total wages generated for the first quarter (including the wages for the intern position identified below) were \$94,065.

5.) Interns: There was one intern during the first quarter. Since there was only one individual, the wages have been included in the "other employment" category for confidentiality reasons.

D. Training & Education

See Table 9 for a review of training and education activity.

1.) Vocational Education: During the first quarter, ten individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

2.) Higher Education: A total of sixteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the first quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$5,000 for the school year (\$2,500 per semester).

3.) Summer Intern Program: The APICDA Board of Directors has approved a major, new intern program to commence in the summer of 2000. The purpose of this program is to provide summer (or non-school time) employment opportunities to residents receiving higher education scholarships in fields of interest to them, APICDA and its subsidiaries. APICDA will offer interns employment in companies in which it has ownership, with its CDQ partners, and with other companies in a variety of occupational fields related to the needs of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands. Salaries and other costs will be borne in whole or part by APICDA. The work performance of interns will be evaluated on a continuing basis. Interns will be able to return to the program year after year during their college career, providing their evaluations are good and they continue to maintain eligibility for higher education scholarships. Eventually, interns could be offered full-time positions with APICDA or its subsidiaries.

E. Other Issues

There are no other issues not otherwise addressed.

III. Administration

A. Board Activities

1.) Changes in Board Members: There were no changes in board members during the quarter.

2.) Decisions/Actions: The Board of Directors for APICDA and AJV met in February. The Policy and Procedures Committee also met. There were no other decision or actions of major consequence that are not included here or in the confidential section of this report.

3.) Schedule for Next Quarter: The next board meeting will be in May, immediately following the village conference.

B. CDP Amendment Status

There were several plan amendments during the first quarter, including: a comprehensive modification of the 2000 budgets, reflecting the board's February actions; formation of the Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C.; formation of the Dipper, L.L.C.; formation of the Konrad 1, L.L.C.; and, formation of the Nikolski Lodge, L.L.C.

IV. Fishing

A. Harvest Activities for the Quarter

1.) Pollock CDQ Harvest: The pollock "A" Season CDQ fishery was completed early in the second quarter. See Table 10 for a review of the completed fishery.

2.) Pacific Cod CDQ Harvest: See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

There were no other CDQ fisheries during the first quarter. During the second quarter, the following fisheries should commence : opilio Tanner crab, Pacific cod, halibut, sablefish, and Atka mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch.

B. Compliance

APICDA and its partners are and were in full compliance with all NMFS and State of Alaska reporting requirements.

C. Other Fishing Issues/Activities

There were no other fishing issues or activities.
