

I. Quarterly Highlights

APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the second quarter, a total of 130 job positions (75 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$606,301.

During the second quarter, three individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

A total of twenty individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the second quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

APICDA hosted a two day conference of the leaders from each of its eligible CDQ villages in April. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages. Over thirty representatives of village corporations, IRAs or traditional councils, and local governments attended.

APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. and the Starbound Partnership agreed to the purchase of twenty percent of the F/T *Starbound* by AJV. The purchase will be effective July 1, 1999.

APICDA completed its Bering Sea "A" Season CDQ pollock fishery during March. Since then we have conducted target Atka mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ fisheries in the Aleutian Islands. Additionally, we have harvested a portion of our Pacific cod, Aleutian Island sablefish, and Bering Sea sablefish CDQ allocation. The opilio CDQ fishery was also prosecuted during the second quarter.

Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) operations commenced in early May. APS will be buying and processing halibut, sablefish, and Greenland turbot CDQ from local Atka fishermen. Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C. operations began in mid-June. Puffin buys halibut from local St. George fishermen. The charter boat Grand Aleutian also commenced halibut charter operations out of Unalaska in June.

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II. Community Development

A. Progress Toward Goals, Objectives, Milestones

The following is a review of the highlights from APICDA's goals, objectives, and milestones. See Tables 1 through 7 for a specific review of all milestones, by community.

1.) Employment: APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the second quarter, a total of 130 job positions (75 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$606,301.

2.) Training: APICDA's goal for 1998 is to provide vocational education and training assistance for any resident who desires the opportunity or needs help. During the second quarter, three individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

3.) Education: A total of twenty individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the second quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

4.) APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. (AJV) Activities: AJV activities during the second quarter consisted of overseeing the various subsidiary corporations, including Atka Pride Seafoods, Kayux Development, L.L.C., APICDA Vessels, Inc., the Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C., the Nazan Bay Inn, Prowler, L.L.C., Ocean Prowler, L.L.C., and Golden Dawn, L.L.C. AJV continued to discuss the formation of new joint ventures corporations, and to review other investment opportunities.

5.) APICDA Vessels, Incorporated (AVI): AVI activities during the second quarter consisted of managing its various vessels. This included the three AP boats, the *Stardust*, and the *Bonanza*, and the halibut sport charter vessel *Grand Aleutian*. The *Bonanza* moved from Homer to Atka, where it will be fishing halibut this summer. The *Stardust* fished sablefish in the Bering Sea and the Aleutian Islands, before moving to St. George to serve as a tender for halibut.

6.) Small Vessel Acquisition Program (SVAP): During the December, 1998, board meeting, the SVAP was suspended for 1998 and 1999. The suspension will carry through 1999 while the board reviews methods to improve the program.

7.) Kayux Development L.L.C.: Construction of the new outfall on St. George Island was completed in December. Funds for the project were advanced by Kayux Development, L.L.C. Senator Stevens included an appropriation to reimburse Kayux for the construction costs. The new outfall has positive environmental impacts

since it disperses processing waste away from a nearby fur seal rookery and expands the processing capability of the harbor. The federal funds should be available during the second quarter.

8.) Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) Activities: APS started up in May. Approximately 98,000 pounds of halibut were landed by the end of the second quarter. Fishing is picking up, and market prices are better than last year.

9.) Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C.: St. George fishermen, fishing for Puffin Seafoods, starting operating in mid June. The fish are being tendered by the *Stardust* to St. Paul, where they are being processed by Trident Seafoods. This is a less than ideal situation since we would rather process the fish in St. George, but there is insufficient halibut CDQ and IFQ available to cover the cost of a processing operation. Additionally, Northern Air Cargo ceased flying to St. George, making a fresh fish operation impossible.

10.) Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C.: The company is open for business, and some activity is taking place.

11.) OceanLogic, L.L.C.: OceanLogic, L.L.C., a partnership between APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc., Yukon Delta Fisheries, Inc., and Parity Corporation, is moving forward with development of new software geared. The new software will be capable of managing shoreside and mothership cooperatives in compliance with the American Fisheries Act and Steller Sea Lion rules and regulations. The software will be beta tested and in place by the end of the year.

12.) False Pass Processing/Barge Dipper: AJV purchased the barge Dipper in August, 1998. In late January, 1999, the state authorized AJV to begin maintenance and other renovation work on the vessel. Unfortunately, the good fall weather turned into the worse winter in years, and very little work could be performed. When complete, AJV plans to moor the barge in False Pass to process Pacific cod, salmon and other species. Renovation of the Dipper is behind schedule, but we are still hopeful it can be on scene in False Pass by the fall.

13.) Nikolski Near Shore Resource Assessment: APICDA is implementing plans to conduct an assessment of the near shore fishery resources in the Nikolski area. The focus will be on rockfish, sea bass, octopus, shrimp and other species. Dependent upon the assessment, APICDA (in conjunction with the Nikolski Fishermen's Association) will develop plans for a small scale commercial fishery based upon the species identified as having the greatest potential. The *NIKKA D*, AJV's twenty-eight foot skiff from Atka, has been deployed for the assessment. The crew is from Nikolski.

15.) Charter Vessel *Grand Aleutian*: The halibut sport fishing vessel *Grand Aleutian*, one of the Aleutian region's premiere sport fishing vessels, commenced operations in June, 1998. During one charter, a 428 pound halibut was landed. Pictures of the halibut and the accompanying story made CNN and various other publications. Bookings increased as a result.

16.) Sea Urchins: APICDA submitted applications to ADF&G in April to conduct sea urchin mariculture operations at various locations in the Aleutian Islands and the Alaska Peninsula. APICDA also resumed its sea urchin resource assessment this summer.

17.) Flatfish Development: APICDA is developing plans to become a participant in the flatfish industry. We have retained individuals familiar with the industry and marketing to assist us. A marketing trip to Europe is planned for the third quarter.

B. Outreach

APICDA's human resource administrator, Aimee Kniazowski, conducted numerous meetings with the local Community Liaison Officers and our harvesting partners to discuss ways to improve and expand communications with local residents.

In April, APICDA hosted a two day conference of the leaders from each of its eligible CDQ villages. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages. Over thirty representatives of village corporations, IRAs or traditional councils, and local governments attended. The current and future APICDA and subsidiary plans and programs were discussed and debated. Each village made a presentation concerning their needs and desires. Breakout sessions occurred. Both positive and negative feedback about APICDA was encouraged. The conference report is being prepared and will be available shortly. This will be an annual event.

C. Employment

1.) Management/Administrative: During the second quarter, there were twenty local residents who received compensation for management/administrative duties. These function ranged from staff employment, honorariums, to Community Liaison Officers (CLO) activities. The total expended during the quarter was \$94,546.

2.) Direct Employment from CDQ Pollock Fishing: There were no residents employed in pollock fishing and/or processing operations during the quarter since there were no pollock fishing operations.

3.) Other Fishing: Thirty-four individuals were employed as skippers, crew members, and processing employees in the various non-pollock fisheries during the quarter. Total wages were \$105,465.

4.) Other Employment: Fifteen individuals were employed in a variety of non-direct fishery activities, including the gear storage warehouse in Nelson Lagoon, construction projects directly related to APICDA CDP projects, and other activities. Total wages were \$84,076.

5.) Interns: There were no interns during the second quarter.

See Table 8 for a quarterly and year-to-date review of employment activity.

D. Training & Education

1.) Vocational Education: During the second quarter, three individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

2.) A total of twenty individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the second quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

See Table 9 for a review of training and education activity.

E. Other Issues

There are no other issues not otherwise addressed.

III. Administration

A. Board Activities

1.) Changes in Board Members: There were no changes in board members during the quarter.

2.) Decisions/Actions: The Board of Directors for APICDA and AJV, respectively, met in April following the community outreach conference. There were no other decision or actions of major consequence that are not included here or in the confidential section of this report.

3.) Schedule for Next Quarter: The next board meeting will be in November. In the interim, various committees will meet as appropriate and needed to address a variety of issues.

B. CDP Amendment Status

There were three substantial plan amendments during the second quarter: a comprehensive modification of the 1999 budgets; an budget amendment for the purchase of halibut and sablefish quota shares; and, an amendment transferring a portion of BBEDC's Aleutian Islands MSCDQ allocation to APICDA so that it could be harvested by the F/T *Seafisher*.

IV. Fishing

A. Harvest Activities for the Quarter

1.) Pollock CDQ Harvest: APICDA completed its Bering Sea "A" Season CDQ pollock fishery during the first quarter. There was no pollock fishery during the second quarter.

See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

Since then we have conducted target Atka mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ fisheries in the Aleutian Islands. Additionally, we have harvested a portion of our Pacific cod, Aleutian Island sablefish, and Bering Sea sablefish CDQ allocation. The opilio CDQ fishery was also prosecuted during the second quarter.

Table 11 is a new table that provides a report on the amount of pollock and prohibited species harvested during MSCDQ fisheries that are not counted against the MSCDQ allocation.

B. Compliance

APICDA slightly exceeded its opilio CDQ harvest by 2, 477 pounds during the second quarter. This was the result of a communication error between the vessel and the plant. As soon as the mistake was realized (while the vessel was still on the grounds), we contacted ADF&G to address the situation. The overage was seized by the state. Otherwise, APICDA and its partners are and were in full compliance with all NMFS and State of Alaska reporting requirements.

C. Other Fishing Issues/Activities

There were no other fishing issues or activities.
