

I. Quarterly Highlights

APICDA's employment goal for 2000 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the third quarter, a total of 265 job positions (130 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.6 million.

During the third quarter, eleven individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs, bringing the year's total to sixty-one scholarships.

Twenty-two individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Effective January 1, 2000, APICDA increased its higher education scholarships from \$3,000 per individual per year to \$5,000 per individual per year.

APICDA received its 2001 and 2002 CDQ allocation recommendations from the state in September. The state is recommending a reduction in APICDA's pollock allocation from 16% to 14%. APICDA has challenged the state's recommendations with the Secretary of Commerce.

Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. opened in June. BPS is a joint venture between AJV and Aleutian Quality Seafoods, Inc., with each company owning fifty percent. BPS will initially operate the barge Dipper in False Pass, buying and processing salmon, Pacific cod, halibut, and other species. When the new boat harbor is constructed in False Pass, BPS will construct a shore plant adjacent to the harbor and expand its production. During the summer, BPS purchased and processed salmon from local and regional vessels, and moved into Pacific cod in late August and September. BPS closed for the fall in early October, and will reopen in January.

Halibut CDQ fisheries in St. George and Atka were completed in August and October respectively.

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II. Community Development

A. Progress Toward Goals, Objectives, Milestones

The following is a review of the highlights from APICDA's goals, objectives, and milestones. See Tables 1 through 7 for a specific review of all milestones, by community.

1.) Employment: APICDA's employment goal for 2000 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the third quarter, a total of 265 job positions (130 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.6 million.

2.) Training: APICDA's goal is to provide vocational education and training assistance for any resident who desires the opportunity or needs help. During the third quarter, eleven individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs, bringing the year's total to sixty-one scholarships.

3.) Education: Twenty-two individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Higher education scholarships are \$5,000 per school year per individual.

4.) APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. (AJV) Activities: AJV activities during the third quarter consisted of overseeing the various subsidiary corporations, including Atka Pride Seafoods, Kayux Development, L.L.C., APICDA Vessels, Inc., the Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C., the Nazan Bay Inn, Prowler, L.L.C., Ocean Prowler, L.L.C., and Golden Dawn, L.L.C. AJV continued to discuss the formation of new joint ventures corporations, and to review other investment opportunities.

5.) APICDA Vessels, Incorporated (AVI): AVI activities during the third quarter consisted of managing its fleet during the fisheries. This includes the five AP boats, the *Stardust*, the *Bonanza*, and the halibut sport charter vessel *Grand Aleutian*.

6.) Small Vessel Acquisition Program (SVAP): During the December 1998, board meeting, the SVAP was suspended. The suspension will carry through 2000 while the board reviews methods to improve the program.

7.) Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) Activities: APS commenced operations in May. Through September 30, the local fleet had harvested a total of 840,835 pounds of halibut. This is substantially higher than harvests through the same time period in the past. APS is expected to operate profitably again in 2000.

8.) Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C.: St. George fishermen, fishing for Puffin Seafoods, started fishing in mid-June and completed their harvest in August. The fish were be tendered to St. Paul, where Trident Seafoods handled the processing. Through September 30, the local fleet harvested a total of 100,665 pounds (96.18% of their allocation) of halibut CDQ. In addition, the fleet harvested approximately 18,000 pounds of halibut IFQ. Puffin is expected to break even or show a small profit in 2000.

9.) Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C.: The company is open for business, and some activity is taking place.

10.) OceanLogic, L.L.C.: OceanLogic, L.L.C., completed development of new software capable of managing shoreside and mothership cooperatives in compliance with the American Fisheries Act and Steller Sea Lion rules and regulations. Software for a vessel monitoring system and an electronic logbook are also nearing completion.

11.) Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. and the Barge Dipper: The Dipper moved to False Pass in late May, and BPS commenced operations in early June. This has been a major project for AJV, and will be a huge boost to the economy and families of False Pass. The company purchased salmon throughout the summer and early fall, before switching to Pacific cod in late August and September.

12.) Nikolski Lodge: Construction of the lodge began earlier in the summer. A variety of transportation and other logistical delays caused construction to begin later than expected. As a result, construction was halted for the winter, and will resume in the spring. We expect the lodge to open for business sometime next summer.

13.) Sea Urchins: APICDA expects to commence limited commercial sea urchin harvesting and processing operations in 2001.

B. Outreach

APICDA staff traveled to many of our communities during the third quarter to meet with residents and discuss a wide variety of CDQ and development related issues. APICDA's human resources director, the Unalaska field representative, and the local community liaison officers met frequently to share information regarding employment, training, and other opportunities.

In May, APICDA hosted the third annual Community Outreach Conference. This was a two day meeting of the leaders from each of APICDA's eligible CDQ villages. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages.

C. Employment

See Table 8 for a quarterly and year-to-date review of employment activity.

1.) Management/Administrative: During the third quarter, there were twenty-four local residents who received compensation for management/administrative duties. These functions ranged from staff employment, honorariums, to Community Liaison Officers (CLO) activities. The total expended during the quarter was \$138,943.

2.) Direct Employment from CDQ Pollock Fishing: There were eight CDQ residents employed in pollock fishing and/or processing operations at-sea on the Starbound during the quarter.

3.) Other Fishing: Seventy-six individuals were employed as skippers, crew members, and processing employees in the various non-pollock fisheries during the quarter. Total wages were \$614,016.

4.) Other Employment: Twenty-two individuals were employed in a variety of non-direct fishery activities, including the gear storage warehouse in Nelson Lagoon, construction projects directly related to APICDA CDP projects, and other activities. Total wages generated for the third.

5.) Interns: There three intern during the third quarter.

6.) Ancillary Employment and Economic Impacts: The activities of APICDA and its subsidiaries generates significant economic benefits in the region, but much of the benefit is not captured by the existing employment and earnings data tables. For example, the Bering Pacific Seafoods facility in False Pass purchases fish from resident fishermen, from fishermen living in the region (but outside the CDQ eligible community), and from fishermen living outside the region. Similarly, BPS (and other APICDA subsidiaries) employs local residents, regional residents, other Alaska residents, and non-residents. The purchase of fish and the payment of wages, whether to residents or non-residents, have an undeniable economic impact in the community. Goods are purchased with the money received and taxes are paid to the city, the borough and the state.

D. Training & Education

See Table 9 for a review of training and education activity.

1.) Vocational Education: During the third quarter, eleven individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

2.) Higher Education: Twenty-two individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$5,000 for the school year (\$2,500 per semester).

3.) Summer Intern Program: The APICDA Board of Directors has approved a major, new intern program to commence in the summer of 2000. The purpose of this program is to provide summer (or non-school time) employment opportunities to residents receiving higher education scholarships in fields of interest to them, APICDA and its subsidiaries. APICDA will offer interns employment in companies in which it has ownership, with its CDQ partners, and with other companies in a variety of occupational fields related to the needs of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands. Salaries and other costs will be borne in whole or part by APICDA. The work performance of interns will be evaluated on a continuing basis. Interns will be able to return to the program year after year during their college career, providing their evaluations are good and they continue to maintain eligibility for higher education scholarships. Eventually, interns could be offered full-time positions with APICDA or its subsidiaries.

This program has two current participants: one individual is employed with the law firm of Foster, Pepper, Rubini & Reeves, and the other is employed by the Aleutian Pribilof Islands Association.

E. Other Issues

There are no other issues not otherwise addressed.

III. Administration

A. Board Activities

1.) Changes in Board Members: There were no changes in board members during the quarter.

2.) Decisions/Actions: The Board of Directors for APICDA met in August to approve the proposed CDP. There were no other decision or actions of major consequence that are not included here or in the confidential section of this report.

3.) Schedule for Next Quarter: The next scheduled board meeting will be in November.

B. CDP Amendment Status

There were no substantial plan amendments during the third quarter.

IV. Fishing

A. Harvest Activities for the Quarter

1.) Pollock CDQ Harvest: The pollock "C/D" Season CDQ fishery began in the third quarter and extended into the fourth quarter. See Table 10 for a review of the completed fishery.

2.) Pacific Cod CDQ Harvest: A significant portion of the Pacific cod CDQ fishing occurred in the third quarter. Bycatch rates of halibut were extremely low. The CDQ fishery will conclude in the fourth quarter.

See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

3.) Atka Mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ Harvest: Atka mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ fishing occurred during the third quarter.

See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

4.) Halibut CDQ Harvests: A total of 841,000 pounds of Area 4B halibut has been harvested by local Atka fishermen this year. The catch is ahead of last year's pace. In St. George, local fishermen harvested 101,000 pounds of the Area 4C halibut CDQ in June.

See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

5.) Sablefish CDQ Harvests: Efforts to harvest Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands sablefish CDQ commenced during the third quarter. Year-to-date, a total of 23,664 pounds and 27,893 pounds of Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands sablefish CDQ respectively has been harvested. This is a substantial improvement over 1999 and previous years.

6.) PSC Harvest: The bycatch of prohibited species continues to be low. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

There were no other CDQ fisheries during the third quarter.

B. Compliance

With the exception of a slight overage in the Atka mackerel fishery (less than two mt), APICDA and its partners are and were in full compliance with all NMFS and State of Alaska reporting requirements.

C. Other Fishing Issues/Activities

There were no other fishing issues or activities.
