

## **I. Quarterly Highlights**

APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the third quarter, a total of 229 job positions (101 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.4 million.

During the third quarter, eight individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

A total of seventeen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

APICDA published the results of the two day conference of the leaders from each of its eligible CDQ villages in April. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages. Over thirty representatives of village corporations, IRAs or traditional councils, and local governments attended. Copies were sent to all participants and village entities.

APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. and the Starbound Partnership have concluded the paperwork necessary for AJV's purchase of twenty percent of the F/T *Starbound* by AJV. Assuming approval by the state of Alaska and the National Marine Fisheries Service, the formal agreements will be signed November 15 and the purchase will be effective retroactive to July 1, 1999.

APICDA engaged in a number of CDQ fisheries during the third quarter, including "B" and "C" Season pollock, Area 4B and 4C halibut, sablefish, and Pacific cod. Flatfish CDQ fishing will begin in the fourth quarter, as well as completion of the pollock CDQ fishery.

Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) operations commenced in early May. Through the end of the third quarter, local Atka fishermen harvested 581,622 pounds of the Area 4B halibut CDQ allocation.

Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C. operations began in mid-June. Puffin buys halibut from local St. George fishermen. Through the end of the third quarter, local St. George fishermen harvested 100,667 pounds (99.2%) of the Area 4C halibut CDQ allocation.

AJV and Aleutian Quality Seafoods, Inc., have agreed to form Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. This is a fifty/fifty joint venture. BPS will lease the barge Dipper from AJV, and operate a processing facility in False Pass. Processing operations should commence early this winter. Pacific cod, salmon, halibut, and other species will be purchased.

## II. Community Development

### A. Progress Toward Goals, Objectives, Milestones

The following is a review of the highlights from APICDA's goals, objectives, and milestones. See Tables 1 through 7 for a specific review of all milestones, by community.

1.) Employment: APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the third quarter, a total of 229 job positions (101 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.4 million.

2.) Training: APICDA's goal for 1998 is to provide vocational education and training assistance for any resident who desires the opportunity or needs help. During the third quarter, eight individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

3.) Education: A total of seventeen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

4.) APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. (AJV) Activities: AJV activities during the third quarter consisted of overseeing the various subsidiary corporations, including Atka Pride Seafoods, Kayux Development, L.L.C., APICDA Vessels, Inc., the Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C., the Nazan Bay Inn, Prowler, L.L.C., Ocean Prowler, L.L.C., and Golden Dawn, L.L.C. AJV continued to discuss the formation of new joint ventures corporations, and to review other investment opportunities.

5.) APICDA Vessels, Incorporated (AVI): AVI activities during the third quarter consisted of managing its various vessels. This included the three AP boats, the *Stardust*, and the *Bonanza*, and the halibut sport charter vessel *Grand Aleutian*. The *Bonanza* moved from Homer to Atka, where it will be fished halibut this summer, and then to the Gulf of Alaska in the fall to harvest IFQ halibut. The *Stardust* fished sablefish in the Bering Sea and the Aleutian Islands, before moving to St. George to serve as a tender for halibut. The *Stardust* then moved to Atka to participate in both halibut and sablefish CDQ fisheries.

6.) Small Vessel Acquisition Program (SVAP): During the December, 1998, board meeting, the SVAP was suspended for 1998 and 1999. The suspension will carry through 1999 while the board reviews methods to improve the program.

7.) Kayux Development L.L.C.: Construction of the new outfall on St. George Island was completed in December. Funds for the project were advanced by Kayux Development, L.L.C. Senator Stevens included an appropriation to reimburse Kayux for the construction costs. The new outfall has positive environmental impacts since it disperses processing waste away from a nearby fur seal rookery and expands the processing capability of the harbor. The federal funds were received during the third quarter.

8.) Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) Activities: APS started up in May. Approximately **98,000** pounds of halibut were landed by the end of the third quarter. Fishing was, and market prices are substantially better than last year. We expect to operate profitably in 1999.

9.) Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C.: St. George fishermen, fishing for Puffin Seafoods, starting operating in mid June. The fish were tendered by the *Stardust* to St. Paul, where they were processed by Trident Seafoods. This is a less than ideal situation since we would rather process the fish in St. George, but there is insufficient halibut CDQ and IFQ available to cover the cost of a processing operation. Additionally, Northern Air Cargo ceased flying to St. George, making a fresh fish operation impossible. All of the halibut CDQ was harvested by local St. George fishermen. We expect Puffin Seafoods to break even in 1999.

10.) Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C.: The company is open for business, and some activity is taking place. Additional work needs to be done before the facility will be attractive to outside vessels. This includes convincing the Coast Guard to buoy the channel entrance to the lagoon.

11.) OceanLogic, L.L.C.: OceanLogic, L.L.C., a partnership between APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc., Yukon Delta Fisheries, Inc., and Parity Corporation, is completing development of new software capable of managing shoreside and mothership cooperatives in compliance with the American Fisheries Act and Steller Sea Lion rules and regulations. The software will be beta tested and in place by the end of the year.

12.) Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. and the Barge Dipper: AJV has reached agreement with Aleutian Quality Seafoods, Inc., the U.S. subsidiary of Vanna As, a company based in Tromso, Norway, to form Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. BPS will be located in False Pass and will operate the Dipper and attendant shoreside facilities. This is a fifty/fifty joint venture. Mr. John Nickels has been hired to serve as plant manager. John is the mayor of False Pass.

Renovation of the Dipper is nearly complete, and it is on-line to move to False Pass in December or January. Possible delays revolve around completion of the necessary False

Pass infrastructure: mooring dolphins for the Dipper, housing, septic systems, water lines, etc. We have hired the construction company of Kelly Ryan to transport the housing we purchased in St. Paul to False Pass, and perform associated construction work. We are using as many local residents as possible. We expect BPS will open around February 1, 2000.

13.) Nikolski Near Shore Resource Assessment: APICDA initiated its assessment of the near shore fishery resources in the Nikolski area. The focus was on rockfish, sea bass, octopus, shrimp and other species. The *NIKKA D*, AJV's twenty-eight foot skiff from Atka, was deployed for the assessment. The crew is from Nikolski. The assessment will continue in 2000.

15.) Charter Vessel *Grand Aleutian*: The halibut sport fishing vessel *Grand Aleutian*, one of the Aleutian region's premiere sport fishing vessels, commenced operations in June. During one charter, a 428 pound halibut was landed. Pictures of the halibut and the accompanying story made CNN and various other publications. Bookings increased as a result.

16.) Sea Urchins: APICDA submitted applications to ADF&G in April to conduct sea urchin mariculture operations at various locations in the Aleutian Islands and the Alaska Peninsula. APICDA also resumed its sea urchin resource assessment this summer.

17.) Flatfish Development: APICDA is developing plans to become a participant in the flatfish industry. We have retained individuals familiar with the industry and marketing to assist us. A marketing trip to Europe occurred in the third quarter. CDQ flatfish harvesting will begin in the fourth quarter.

18.) Quota Shares: AJV purchased approximately 100,000 additional pounds of halibut and sablefish Category A quota shares during the third quarter,

## **B. Outreach**

APICDA's human resource administrator, Aimee Kniazowski, resigned in July to assume the Assistant City Manager position in Unalaska. Mr. David McGlashan, an Aleut from Akutan, was hired in September as her replacement. Since then, Mr. McGlashan has met with the local Community Liaison Officers and our harvesting partners to discuss ways to further involve local residents in a variety of employment opportunities.

In addition to Mr. McGlashan's efforts, APICDA staff has traveled to each community a number of times during the third quarter to meet with residents and discuss a wide variety of CDQ and development related issues.

In April, APICDA hosted a two day conference of the leaders from each of its eligible CDQ villages. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages. Over thirty representatives of village corporations, IRAs or traditional councils, and local governments attended. The current and future APICDA and subsidiary plans and programs were discussed and debated. Each village made a presentation concerning their needs and desires. Breakout sessions occurred. Both positive and negative feedback about APICDA was encouraged. A conference report was completed and mailed to all local entities and participants. The conference will be an annual event.

### **C. Employment**

1.) Management/Administrative: During the third quarter, there were twenty-one local residents who received compensation for management/administrative duties. These function ranged from staff employment, honorariums, to Community Liaison Officers (CLO) activities. The total expended during the quarter was \$75,487.

2.) Direct Employment from CDQ Pollock Fishing: There one resident employed in pollock fishing and/or processing operations during the quarter. Total wages earned were \$6,661.

3.) Other Fishing: Fifty-five individuals were employed as skippers, crew members, and processing employees in the various non-pollock fisheries during the quarter. Total wages were \$655,551.

4.) Other Employment: Twenty-two individuals were employed in a variety of non-direct fishery activities, including the gear storage warehouse in Nelson Lagoon, construction projects directly related to APICDA CDP projects, and other activities. Total wages were \$76,040.

5.) Interns: There were no interns during the third quarter.

### **D. Training & Education**

1.) Vocational Education: During the third quarter, eight individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

2.) A total of seventeen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the third quarter of the year. Generally, each scholarship is in the amount of \$3,000 for the school year.

#### **E. Other Issues**

There are no other issues not otherwise addressed.

### **III. Administration**

#### **A. Board Activities**

1.) Changes in Board Members: Effective October 1, 1999, Anthony Mercurief resigned as the St. George Fishermen's Association board member to APICDA. His replacement will be Mr. Ted Lekanof. Mr. Lekanof is a member of the St. George Fishermen's Association, and is a subsistence and commercial fisherman.

Mr. Jim O'Connell, currently serving as the Financial Industry board member to APICDA, announced that he will resign effective with the start of the next board meeting. Mr. O'Connell moved to Spokane, Washington. His replacement will be Mr. Pete Crandall. Mr. Crandall is a Vice-President with the National Bank of Alaska and serves as manager of the Southeast Alaska region. He will assume his position with the start of the next board meeting.

2.) Decisions/Actions: The Board of Directors for AJV met in August via teleconference to approve the purchase of two thirty-two foot longline vessels. There were no other decision or actions of major consequence that are not included here or in the confidential section of this report.

3.) Schedule for Next Quarter: The next board meeting will be in November. In the interim, various committees will meet as appropriate and needed to address a variety of issues.

#### **B. CDP Amendment Status**

There were no substantial plan amendments during the third quarter.

#### **IV. Fishing**

##### **A. Harvest Activities for the Quarter**

1.) Pollock CDQ Harvest: APICDA harvested a significant portion of its Bering Sea “B/C” Seasons CDQ pollock fishery during the third quarter. The CDQ fishery will be completed in the fourth quarter.

2.) Atka Mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ Harvest: There was no harvesting effort during the third quarter. An open access fishery did take place, and showed a substantial bycatch of Aleutian Islands “other Rockfish.” A decision was made not to conduct the CDQ fishery for fear of exceeding allocated bycatch amounts. It is unlikely the remainder of the Atka mackerel and Pacific Ocean perch CDQ allocation will be harvested.

3.) Pacific Cod CDQ Harvest: Pacific cod CDQ fishing resumed in the third quarter. Bycatch rates of halibut were extremely low. The CDQ fishery will conclude in the fourth quarter.

4.) Halibut CDQ Harvests: A total of 581,622 pounds of Area 4B halibut has been harvested by local Atka fishermen this year. Three of the local boats exceeded 100,000 pound harvests, and one has exceeded 200,000 pounds.

In St. George, local fishermen harvested 100,667 pounds of the Area 4C halibut CDQ. There is slightly less than 1,000 pounds remaining. In addition to the CDQ, local IFQ was also harvested.

5.) Sablefish CDQ Harvests: Efforts continued to harvest Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands sablefish CDQ during the third quarter. There was mixed success. Year-to-date, a total of 1,534 pounds and 13,386 pounds of Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands sablefish CDQ respectively has been harvested.

6.) PSC Harvest: The bycatch of prohibited species continues to be low. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

**B. Compliance**

During the CDQ pollock fishery in August, there was no observer present at the Trident Seafood's Sand Point when a pollock delivery was made. The observer was unable to reach Sand Point due to weather conditions. Due to a communication foul up, this information was not relayed to the appropriate Trident personnel, who assumed the observer was present. The vessel made its delivery as scheduled. Afterwards, it was discovered the observer had failed to make it in to Sand Point. No formal notification has been received from NMFS.

**C. Other Fishing Issues/Activities**

There were no other fishing issues or activities.
