

I. Quarterly Highlights

APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the fourth quarter, a total of 319 job positions (112 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.8 million.

During the fourth quarter, two individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

A total of eighteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the fourth quarter of the year. Commencing with 2000, each scholarship will generally be in the amount of \$5,000 for the school year (an increase from \$3,000 per year).

Mr. John Nickels has been hired to serve as plant manager of Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. John is the mayor of False Pass. BPS is a joint venture between APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc., and Aleutian Quality Seafoods, Inc., and will operate a processing facility in False Pass. BPS will open this spring.

APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. completed the purchase of twenty percent of the Starbound Partnership in November. The company owns and operates the F/T *Starbound*. The purchase is retroactive to July 1, 1999.

APICDA engaged in a number of CDQ fisheries during the fourth quarter, including pollock and yellowfin sole.

Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) and Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C. operated profitably during the year. Over 700,000 pounds (91% of the allocation) of Area 4B CDQ halibut and 100,000 pounds (99% of the allocation) of Area 4C CDQ halibut were harvested.

APICDA Vessels, Inc., purchased two thirty-two foot longline vessels from the Yukon Delta Longline, Inc. The vessels will be extended to thirty-six feet this winter. In the spring, one vessel will move to Atka to augment the local fleet. The other will operate at various locations, including St. George.

During its November meeting, the APICDA board of directors approved development of a comprehensive summer intern program for students attending college. The program will be implemented in 2000.

John Moller, AVI Manager, has entered a management trainee program with the company managing the longline catcher-processing vessels the F/LL Prowler, F/LL Ocean Prowler, and the F/LL Bering Prowler (AJV owns a portion of each vessel). John will remain on the AJV payroll during the internship. Bill Shaisnikoff, an Aleut from Unalaska, will replace John and become AVI Manager effective January 1, 2000.

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II. Community Development

A. Progress Toward Goals, Objectives, Milestones

The following is a review of the highlights from APICDA's goals, objectives, and milestones. See Tables 1 through 7 for a specific review of all milestones, by community.

1.) Employment: APICDA's employment goal for 1999 is to provide at least 80 jobs for local residents. By the conclusion of the fourth quarter, a total of 319 job positions (112 unique individuals) had been filled, generating wages of \$1.8 million.

2.) Training: APICDA's goal for 1998 is to provide vocational education and training assistance for any resident who desires the opportunity or needs help. During the fourth quarter, two individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

3.) Education: A total of eighteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the fourth quarter of the year. Commencing with January, 2000, higher education scholarships will be increased from \$3,000 per school year to \$5,000 per school.

4.) APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc. (AJV) Activities: AJV activities during the fourth quarter consisted of overseeing the various subsidiary corporations, including Atka Pride Seafoods, Kayux Development, L.L.C., APICDA Vessels, Inc., the Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C., the Nazan Bay Inn, Prowler, L.L.C., Ocean Prowler, L.L.C., and Golden Dawn, L.L.C. AJV continued to discuss the formation of new joint ventures corporations, and to review other investment opportunities.

5.) APICDA Vessels, Incorporated (AVI): AVI activities during the fourth quarter consisted of managing its various vessels. This included the three AP boats, the *Stardust*, and the *Bonanza*, and the halibut sport charter vessel *Grand Aleutian*. The *Bonanza* moved from Homer to Atka, where it will be fished halibut this summer, and then to the Gulf of Alaska in the fall to harvest IFQ halibut. The *Stardust* fished sablefish in the Bering Sea and the Aleutian Islands, before moving to St. George to serve as a tender for halibut. The *Stardust* then moved to Atka to participate in both halibut and sablefish CDQ fisheries.

John Moller, AVI Manager, has entered a management trainee program with the company managing the longline catcher-processing vessels the F/LL Prowler, F/LL Ocean Prowler, and the F/LL Bering Prowler (AJV owns a portion of each vessel). John

will remain on the AJV payroll during the internship. Bill Shaisnikoff, an Aleut from Unalaska, will replace John and become AVI Manager effective January 1, 2000.

6.) Small Vessel Acquisition Program (SVAP): During the December, 1998, board meeting, the SVAP was suspended for 1998 and 1999. The suspension will carry through 1999 while the board reviews methods to improve the program.

7.) Kayux Development L.L.C.: The reduction in the opilio crab GHIL for 2000, and the anticipated closure of the fishery in 2001, has had a severe impact upon St. George Island. The opilio fishery is the main economic force on the island. Kayux Development, L.L.C. will feel the effect of the reduction since the company provides facilities for use by the commercial crab fleet.

8.) Atka Pride Seafoods (APS) Activities: APS started up in May. Approximately 724,000 pounds of halibut were landed by the end of the fourth quarter. Fishing and market prices are substantially better than last year. APS operated profitably in 1999.

9.) Puffin Seafoods, L.L.C.: St. George fishermen, fishing for Puffin Seafoods, starting operating in mid-June. The fish were tendered by the *Stardust* to St. Paul, where they were processed by Trident Seafoods. This is a less than ideal situation since we would rather process the fish in St. George, but there is insufficient halibut CDQ and IFQ available to cover the cost of a processing operation. Additionally, Northern Air Cargo ceased flying to St. George, making a fresh fish operation impossible. All of the halibut CDQ was harvested by local St. George fishermen. Puffin Seafoods operated profitably in 1999.

10.) Nelson Lagoon Storage Company, L.L.C.: The company is open for business, and some activity is taking place. Additional work needs to be done before the facility will be attractive to outside vessels. This includes convincing the Coast Guard to buoy the channel entrance to the lagoon.

11.) OceanLogic, L.L.C.: OceanLogic, L.L.C., a partnership between APICDA Joint Ventures, Inc., Yukon Delta Fisheries, Inc., and Parity Corporation, is completing development of new software capable of managing shoreside and mothership cooperatives in compliance with the American Fisheries Act and Steller Sea Lion rules and regulations. Software for a vessel monitoring system and an electronic logbook are also nearing completion.

12.) Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. and the Barge Dipper: Renovation of the Dipper is nearly complete, however the severe winter has caused construction delays in our shoreside infrastructure. We expect BPS to open in the spring.

13.) Nikolski Near Shore Resource Assessment: APICDA initiated its assessment of the near shore fishery resources in the Nikolski area. The focus was on rockfish, sea bass, octopus, shrimp and other species. The *NIKKA D*, AJV's twenty-eight foot skiff from Atka, was deployed for the assessment. The crew is from Nikolski. The assessment will continue in 2000.

15.) Charter Vessel *Grand Aleutian*: The halibut sport fishing vessel *Grand Aleutian*, one of the Aleutian region's premiere sport fishing vessels, commenced operations in June. During one charter, a 428 pound halibut was landed. Pictures of the halibut and the accompanying story made CNN and various other publications. Bookings increased as a result.

16.) Sea Urchins: APICDA submitted applications to ADF&G in April to conduct sea urchin mariculture operations at various locations in the Aleutian Islands and the Alaska Peninsula. APICDA also resumed its sea urchin resource assessment this summer.

Following several weeks of discussion with the Alaska Department of Fish & Game, APICDA withdrew its mariculture applications without prejudice. Instead, we expect to conduct an additional assessment in St. George this spring, in conjunction with ADF&G personnel, and then to have a small commercial fishery. We are also working with ADF&G to develop guidelines for a small, experimental operation near Nikolski.

17.) Flatfish Development: APICDA continues to develop its plans to become a participant in the flatfish industry. We have retained individuals familiar with the industry and marketing to assist us. A marketing trip to Europe occurred in the third quarter. CDQ yellowfin sole harvesting occurred in the fourth quarter. Samples of various species were produced and sent to Europe for market analysis. Results of the analysis should help determine future directions.

B. Outreach

APICDA promoted Angela Santifer to serve as its human resource director. Angela will be based out of Juneau, and will work closely with David McGlashan, who serves as Field Representative in our Unalaska office. APICDA staff has also traveled to many of our communities during the fourth quarter to meet with residents and discuss a wide variety of CDQ and development related issues.

In April, APICDA hosted a two day conference of the leaders from each of its eligible CDQ villages. The purpose of the conference was to discuss the future of APICDA, its subsidiaries, its impact upon each of the villages, and the goals and desires of the villages. Over thirty representatives of village corporations, IRAs or traditional councils, and local governments attended. The current and future APICDA and subsidiary plans and programs were discussed and debated. Each village made a presentation concerning their needs and desires. Breakout sessions occurred. Both positive and negative feedback about APICDA was encouraged. A conference report was completed and mailed to all local entities and participants. The next conference will be in May, 2000.

C. Employment

1.) Management/Administrative: During the fourth quarter, there were twenty-seven local residents who received compensation for management/administrative duties. These function ranged from staff employment, honorariums, to Community Liaison Officers (CLO) activities. The total expended during the quarter was \$96,955.

2.) Direct Employment from CDQ Pollock Fishing: There was one resident employed in pollock fishing and/or processing operations during the quarter. Total wages earned were \$1,808.

3.) Other Fishing: Thirty-seven individuals were employed as skippers, crew members, and processing employees in the various non-pollock fisheries during the quarter. Total wages were \$179,971.

4.) Other Employment: Twenty-five individuals were employed in a variety of non-direct fishery activities, including the gear storage warehouse in Nelson Lagoon, construction projects directly related to APICDA CDP projects, and other activities. Total wages were \$102,990.

5.) Interns: There were no interns during the fourth quarter.

6.) Unique Individuals Employed: Many of the individuals receiving compensation in the above categories, were active in more than one category. A total of 76 unique village resident individuals overall received compensation during the quarter (no double counting).

D. Training & Education

1.) Vocational Education: During the fourth quarter, two individuals attended various vocational education or specialized training programs.

2.) A total of eighteen individuals used APICDA higher education scholarships during the fourth quarter of the year.

E. Other Issues

There are no other issues not otherwise addressed.

III. Administration

A. Board Activities

1.) Changes in Board Members: Mr. Hugh Pelkey has replaced Mr. Joe Bereskin as the Akutan Fishermen's Association board member to APICDA. Mr. Pelkey is a member of the Akutan Fishermen's Association, and is a subsistence and commercial fisherman.

2.) Decisions/Actions: The board of directors for APICDA and its subsidiaries met in November. Preliminary budgets for 2000 were approved. The APICDA board also approved the development of a comprehensive college summer intern program, and allocated \$100,000 for the project.

3.) Schedule for Next Quarter: The next board meeting will be in February. In the interim, various committees will meet as appropriate and needed to address a variety of issues.

B. CDP Amendment Status

There were three substantial plan amendments during the fourth quarter: a budget amendment; an amendment to purchase twenty percent of the Starbound Partnership; and, an amendment forming the Bering Pacific Seafoods, L.L.C. and the Dipper, L.L.C.

IV. Fishing

A. Harvest Activities for the Quarter

1.) Pollock CDQ Harvest: The pollock CDQ fishery was completed in the fourth quarter. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

2.) Atka Mackerel and Pacific Ocean Perch CDQ Harvest: There was no harvesting effort during the fourth quarter. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

3.) Pacific Cod CDQ Harvest: The CDQ fishery concluded in the fourth quarter. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

4.) Halibut CDQ Harvests: A total of 723,654 pounds of Area 4B CDQ halibut was harvested during this year — over 600,000 pounds by local fishermen. Three of the local boats exceeded 150,000 pound harvests, and one exceeded 200,000 pounds.

In St. George, local fishermen harvested 100,667 pounds of the Area 4C halibut CDQ. There is slightly less than 1,000 pounds remaining. In addition to the CDQ, local IFQ was also harvested.

5.) Sablefish CDQ Harvests: CDQ efforts to harvest Aleutian Islands sablefish were terminated during the fourth quarter due to the prohibition of sablefish retention in state waters (approximately 90% of Aleutian Islands sablefish is harvested inside state waters).

6.) PSC Harvest: The bycatch of prohibited species continues to be low. See Table 10 for a review of the fishery.

B. Compliance

No violations were reported.

C. Other Fishing Issues/Activities

There were no other fishing issues or activities.
