**TRAINING PROGRAM 2: Facilities Maintenance**

Three students continued the Facilities Maintenance course at AVTEC this quarter.

**TRAINING PROGRAM 3: Culinary Arts**

One resident continued the Culinary Arts course at AVTEC this quarter.

**TRAINING PROGRAM 4: Internships**

Four residents completed internships during this quarter. One was completed at Peter Pan Seafoods in Seattle, three were completed at Icicle Seafoods' Seattle office.

**TRAINING PROGRAM 5: Fishing and Seamanship**

One resident was aboard Golden Alaska's catcher vessel the F/V Ocean Leader fishing for Pollock during this quarter continuing a training internship. One resident was aboard Golden Alaska's catcher vessel the F/V American Beauty beginning a training internship. Three residents were aboard the F/V Lisa Marie fishing for Open Access and CDQ Opilio Crab during this quarter as.

***Initiative 2. Comprehensive Job Placement of YDFDA Community Residents***

Goal: Place 75 residents in offshore fisheries

Place 3 residents on catcher vessels after completion of internship

Place 4 residents on the F/V Lisa Marie

Place 7 residents in jobs utilizing vocational training

Milestone:

- ◆ 26 Yukon Delta residents were aboard the Golden Alaska for Pollock AB Season. 13 were returning crew, 13 were first time trainees.
- ◆ 7 Yukon Delta residents were aboard the Starbound as returning crew.
- ◆ 3 Yukon Delta residents were aboard the Ocean Phoenix as first time trainees.
- ◆ 1 Yukon Delta resident continued his internship on Golden Alaska catcher Ocean Leader vessel, 1 Yukon Delta resident began an internship on a Golden Alaska catcher vessel American Beauty.
- ◆ 3 residents were aboard the F/V Lisa Marie as returning crew fishing for crab
- ◆ \$10,006.85 was expended for three crewmembers' training wages fishing aboard the F/V Lisa Marie.
- ◆ \$40,600 was expended for two crewmembers' training aboard the Golden Alaska catcher vessels.

Objective:

- ◆ Provide employment opportunities for residents that would not otherwise be available

***Golden Alaska Seafoods, Inc.***

Twenty-six residents were aboard the M/V Golden Alaska for Pollock AB Season in the 4th quarter. Thirteen were first time trainees, thirteen were returning crew.

***Golden Alaska Catcher Vessels***

One resident was aboard the Golden Alaska catcher vessel F/V Ocean Leader this quarter continuing an internship program. One resident began an internship aboard the Golden Alaska catcher vessel F/V American Beauty this quarter.

***Lisa Marie***

Three residents were aboard the F/V Lisa Marie this quarter fishing open access Opilio Crab and CDQ Opilio Crab and gearing up for IFQ and CDQ Sablefish. All three were returning crew.

***Aleutian Spray Fisheries***

Seven residents were aboard the Starbound for Pollock AB Season out of Dutch Harbor. All seven were returning crew.

***Premier Pacific***

Three residents were aboard the Ocean Phoenix for Pollock AB Season out of Dutch Harbor. All three were first time trainees.

***Initiative 3. Permit Buy-Back, Fishing Vessels/Outboards Loan Guarantees and IFQ Share Purchase Program***

Goal: Enable residents to purchase major equipment and/or permits needed to complete in the local fisheries.

Provide additional royalty income to YDFDA, increased fishing time and profits to vessel and increased employment to residents.

Milestone:

- ◆ The State of Alaska declared the Yukon River salmon season a disaster for 2000 and a further declaration encompassed 2001. The Yukon River remained closed to commercial fishing for the 2001 season. The market value of permits has dropped drastically reflecting extremely low ex-vessel herring and salmon prices. YDFDA has determined that pricing for permits has bottomed out. At this time YDFDA is working with the Division of Investments to obtain permits for our residents. YDFDA is expanding our loan guarantee program and has retained a private broker to assist in securing these low cost permits.
- ◆ YDFDA continues to work with the Division of Investments to execute modification agreements to refinance and delay payments for several loans in arrears due to the disastrous fishing.
- ◆ IFQ purchases – YDFDA is investigating the purchase of additional IFQ shares for fisheries appropriate to the F/V Lisa Marie and Yukon Delta's other investment goals.

Objectives:

- ◆ Make available up to \$100,000 in loan guarantees for permits and vessels/outboard motors.
- ◆ Provide additional royalty income to YDFDA
- ◆ Provide increased fishing time and profits to vessels and employment to residents.

***Initiative 4. Financial Support for Local Small Boat Multi-Fisheries***

Goal: Provide financial support for vessel or gear modifications to participate in Norton Sound fisheries.

Milestone:

- ◆ We are negotiating a market for the 2002 Norton Sound herring season. We have identified two potential buyers for this fishery.

- ◆ We are negotiating a market for the 2002 Norton Sound CDQ Red King Crab season.
- ◆ We have continued our program of providing vessel upgrades to fishermen participating in the Norton Sound herring season. We have provided six reels and shakers to local fishermen. This amounts to 23% of the fishermen on the Yukon with permits who participate in the Norton Sound herring fishery. Our goal is to make this equipment available to 100% of the herring fleet enabling them to be more efficient and thus more competitive in this fishery.

Objective:

- ◆ Provide financial assistance to support private and company vessels to enable them to fish for Norton Sound herring, crab, salmon, halibut and other species.

***Initiative 5. Development of Shoreside Processing Operations***

Goal: Kotlik Yupik Corporation to begin operations as fresh fish fly out facility. However, the State of Alaska closed commercial fishing for the entire area in 2001.

Provide grant funds to assist the private sector fleet with exploratory research for commercial fisheries in proximity to the Yukon Delta

Complete planning and feasibility phase of Nunam Iqua Saltery

Milestone:

- ◆ YDFDA attended numerous meetings with Kotlik to discuss the feasibility of in region projects Kotlik is considering developing.
- ◆ Kotlik Yupik Corporation is working on preparation of a pad for the ice machine and generator being provided by YDFDA with EDA disaster funding. It is anticipated that the pad will be installed in early summer 2002.
- ◆ Nunam Iqua Saltery – This project remains on hold due to the recent closure of the commercial salmon fishery and projected closure in that district for the foreseeable future.
- ◆ YDFDA met with the Emmonak Tribal Council to discuss the feasibility of in region projects Emmonak is considering developing.
- ◆ YDFDA has presented a proposal to purchase or lease the Emmonak Value Added Plant. YDFDA is awaiting the Emmonak Tribal Council's response.
- ◆ YDFDA has received final approval for EDA disaster funds to provide ice machines and support as part of a salmon quality preservation project in Marshall, Mountain Village and Kotlik and provide insulated totes and shipping liners to Emmonak and other villages. This project is being supported with Economic Development Administration Disaster Funding. Two hundred insulated fish totes were shipped in May. The ice machines

have been purchased, one has been delivered to Kotlik and the others are being prepared for shipment this spring.

Objective:

- ◆ Development of local community value-added operations
- ◆ Explore for commercial quantities of fish to be harvested by local residents.

***Initiative 6. Joint Venture Investments in Offshore Catcher/Processor Vessels***

Goal: Invest in joint ventures to purchase and jointly operate catcher and catcher/processor vessels in both open access and CDQ fisheries.

Create additional jobs and long-term employment opportunities

Milestone:

- ◆ YDFDA has received approval and has completed investment in a crab and cod catcher processor.
- ◆ YDFDA is actively pursuing an additional investment in a longline catcher/processor. Analysis of this project continues.
- ◆ YDFDA is involved in ongoing discussions to expand our investment in the Golden Alaska mothership group.
- ◆ Provided Yukon Delta residents with fishing positions aboard the F/V Lisa Marie and Golden Alaska catcher vessels fishing both CDQ and open access.

Objective:

- ◆ To own and operate YDFDA's own fleet of vessels to prosecute the fisheries in the North Pacific.
- ◆ Establish a fleet of combination catcher and catcher/processor vessels to fish open access as well as CDQ fisheries in the Bering Sea.
- ◆ Maximize the employment and payroll benefits derived by local fishermen from open access and CDQ harvests.
- ◆ Protect YDFDA's equity.

***Initiative 7. Financial Support of Community Economic Development of Small Business Fisheries Infrastructure***

Goal: To develop local marine service facilities and fisheries business infrastructure to support the fishing industry.

Milestone:

- ◆ To assure participation, YDFDA sponsored twelve residents to attend several meetings and testify before the Federal Subsistence Board, the State of Alaska Board of Fisheries and State and Federal Regional Fisheries Advisory Councils. Their testimony insured that the possibility of a commercial fishery on the Lower Yukon will continue in the face of pressure to close those fisheries.
- ◆ The Skiff Building and Repair Project continued operation this quarter in Alakanuk. This is the first facility of its kind in the Yukon Delta region. Three Yukon Delta residents were employed this quarter. This quarter they completed three skiffs in addition to miscellaneous repairs.

Several sales are currently pending. CVRF through, its loan program, is trying to arrange the purchase of Yukon Delta skiffs for their residents.

Skiffs are being advertised for sale in all communities of the lower Yukon as part of our outreach program. Loans can be financed through the Division of Investments or AVCP. YDFDA will guarantee up to 40% of loans made through the Division of Investments for YDFDA built skiffs and YDFDA built skiff/motor packages. Loan applications have been sent to the village representatives for potential applicants.

Objective:

- ◆ Fund community and individual projects that provide development opportunities in the lower Yukon
- ◆ Teach salmon quality preservation techniques to fishermen assuring higher quality fish with higher prices.

## **B. OUTREACH**

We have expanded our scholarship program to include non-CDQ villages in the region. This includes non-CDQ villages on the Yukon River between Grayling and Mt. Village which are included in the Lower Yukon and Iditarod School Districts.

YDFDA is searching for a web site developer to design our website. A website would provide additional access to Yukon Delta residents seeking information about our programs.

We have continued our village representative program in our six villages, Alakanuk, Emmonak, Grayling, Kotlik, Mountain Village and Nunam Iqua. The village representatives work in the community to provide information regarding employment opportunities and training positions and administer drug tests to applicants. They also have applications and information on the scholarship programs and loan applications from both the Division of Investments and the AVCP Revolving Loan Program.

YDFDA's newsletter, the "Yukon Drifter", is mailed to every household in member communities.

The training and employment coordinator is located at our Emmonak office. His duties include finding and filling inshore/offshore training and employment opportunities as well as training and educational opportunities at AVTEC, Alaska Pacific University, Sheldon Jackson College, all branches of the University of Alaska, and other learning institutes that meet the qualifications of our Scholarship program. This person administers YDFDA's scholarship programs and YDFDA's permit and gear loan programs through the Division of Investments and the AVCP Revolving Loan Programs. YDFDA feels it is important to administer these programs from the villages so residents have easy access to the programs they are most interested in.

We have contacted several fishermen in Marshall and St. Marys' inviting them to participate in the Norton Sound herring fishery.

Discussions continue with the community of Marshall to coordinate the production and marketing of Lower Yukon River salmon.

We are providing the community of Marshall, a non-CDQ member village, ice machine and salmon totes under our Salmon Quality Preservation Project using EDA Disaster Funding.

The attached announcements were posted in the villages during the third quarter.

### **C. Compliance**

There were no compliance issues during the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2002 in any fishery of which we were aware.

### **D. Other Fishing Issues/Activities**

#### **M/V Golden Alaska , F/V American Beauty and F/V Ocean Leader**

We very closely monitored all salmon bycatch during the CDQ fishery. The mothership carefully positioned the catcher vessels to avoid areas with high concentrations of salmon.

The catcher vessels harvested over 99% of both their allocated CDQ quota and mothership co-op quota. The America Beauty and the Ocean Leader also harvested additional quota in the shoreside sector as part of the Peter Pan co-op.

#### **F/V Lisa Marie**

The F/V Lisa Marie fished both open access and YDFDA CDQ Opilio Crab for the entire first quarter. They harvested 92.9% of YDFDA's CDQ Opilio Crab quota during the first quarter of 2002. They had approx 29,700 pounds to harvest at the beginning of the second quarter of 2002.

#### **32-Foot Vessel**

YDFI owns one 32-foot bow picker. This vessel is currently in storage, dry-docked in Nome.

#### **Pacific-Cod Harvesting Partners**

The catcher processors harvested 99% of YDFDA's A Season allocated target Pacific-Cod quota by March 31, 2002. The remaining 16 tons of Pacific-Cod was saved for harvesting as by-catch in other fisheries prior to June 10, 2002. None of the vessels encountered high by-catch rates of any species.
